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#### News from the Front

Once again members of the Belyj Society inform us of their forthcoming publications and ongoing research: **Erica Brown Ackerman** (Harvard) – Solov'ev in early Belyj's work and thought; **Maryna Albert** (Seattle) – a screenplay adaptation of *Petersburg*; **Milica Banjanin** (Washington University) – the influence of *Commedia dell'arte* in early twentieth century Russian literature; **Virginia H. Bennett** (University of Hawaii) – Belyj and the eighteenth and nineteenth century German philosophers; **Thomas R. Beyer, Jr.** (Middlebury College) – "Marina Cvetaeva and Andrej Belyj: *Razuka* and *Poste razuzki*," scheduled for 1991 in a special edition of Cvetaeva in *Wiener Slavistischer Almanach*; **Martin Bidney** (SUNY–Binghampton) – an article on Bal'mont; **Evelyn Bristol** (University of Illinois) – *Modernism in Russian Literature*; **Maria Carlson** (University of Kansas) – a 350 pp. book manuscript, "No Religion Higher Than Truth;" *The Theosophical Movement in Russia (1875–1922)* and currently working on book, "The Never-Written Novel: Andrej Belyj's Projected Trilogy;" **Charlene Castellano** (Carnegie Mellon University) – *Novyj žurnal* will soon publish "Synesthesia and Narrative Time in *Petersburg*"; **Olga M. Cooke** (Texas A&M University) – "Shamanism in Belyj's *Petersburg*" for *Forum for Modern Language Studies*, and "The Significantly Comic World of Professors in Belyj's *Moskva*" (in progress); **Michael Green** (UC–Irvine) – "Antosha Chekhonte" – Čexov's stories 1880–1882; **Martha Hickey** (Arlington, MA) – researching the House of Arts (1919–22) in Petrograd and Belyj's participation in the House and Vol'fia; **Gerald Janecek** (University of Kentucky) – a book on *zaum*, in Kručenyx and two articles on contemporary Russian

poetry (Minimalism, Conceptualism, Vs. Nekrasov); **Eleonora Magomedova** (University of North Carolina—Chapel Hill) — on Sologub; **John E. Malmstad** (Harvard) — "still working on the Belyj biography;" **Amy Mandelker** (CUNY Graduate Center) — book, *Icons of Theory and Theory of Iconicity in Slavic and Western Aesthetics and Literary Theory* contains a chapter on Belyj; **Louis Pedrotti** (UC—Riverside) — Baron Brambeus; **Stanley Rabinowitz** (Amherst) — "Severnyj vestnik" and the Birth of Russian Modernism;" **Bernice G. Rosenthal** (Fordham) — a forthcoming article on Nietzsche and futurism has some material on Belyj; **Christine Tomei** (Allegheny College) — on the typology of light and color in Petersburg

Barta writes: "In early 1991, I will send to press volume four in *Studies in Russian and German, entitled The European Foundations of Russian Modernism*. The volume contains articles on Belyj.
